





American Federation for Medical Research Conference 2019





Hand Surgery

BMC Congenital Hand Clinic

INTEGRIS Baptist Medical Center (IBMC) in Oklahoma City is the home of the first and only Oklahoma Hand Fellowship Program, which was established 27 years ago. Hand

restore function to the paralyzed shoulder, elbow and hand.

Fellows and Orthopedic Residents attend the BMC Congenital Hand Clinic that is dedicated to providing distinctive medical and surgical care for children born with congenital upper extremity differences. These anomalies include: Congenital tumors, cerebral palsy, and myriad of musculoskeletal anomalies due to abnormal limb development that may affect shoulder, elbow, forearm, wrist, hand and digits. Trainees also participate in treating nerve injuries that occur at birth i.e. Brachial Plexus Birth Palsy which can be treated early by exploring the nerves in the neck-chest area and performing micro-neural surgery to restore function to the paralyzed limb, or if they present late, their condition can be treated by tendon transfers to

The INTEGRIS Congenital Hand Clinic is under the direction of Ghazi Rayan, M.D, who is the Hand Fellowship Director and has been treating children with congenital differences from Oklahoma and neighboring states for more than quarter of a century.


Scholarly Activity Update


INTEGRIS Baptist and Southwest residents and fellows recently participated in an educational lecture and questionnaire for a Quality Improvement project on Bloodborne pathogens. Goals were to provide further education on personal protective equipment and proper technique when using sharps and to discuss strategies to reduce and eliminate sharps and splash injuries. Pertinent findings of the 55 surveys completed were that 83% of those who had injuries during their medical career reported the injuries occurred during medical school or in their PGY1 year. This provides insight on where GME needs to focus on future educational endeavors on this important issue. 13% of those surveyed admitted to having an injury that was not reported, which is improving from 45% from a similar survey given to INTEGRIS residents 5 years ago.



Below are some graphs from Dr. Shipman's Sharps & Splash Injuries: 2019 Update Grand Rounds Lecture




