


LETTER FROM LEGAL

Oklahoma voters approved State Question 788 on June 26, 2018. Thirty other states and the District of Columbia presently allow medical marijuana. The Oklahoma State Department of Health passed emergency rules, and the most recent version of the rules was approved by Governor Fallin on August 6. The law allows individuals with a medical marijuana license to consume, possess and grow medical marijuana. Licenses are valid for 2 years. In order to obtain a license, an individual must obtain a physician recommendation. Only physicians that meet certain legal requirements may recommend the use of medical marijuana. Specifically, a physician must have a valid, unrestricted Oklahoma license and be in good standing with the licensure board. A physician must additionally be board certified as defined by either the Oklahoma Board of Medical Licensure or the Oklahoma Board of Osteopathic Examiners. Physicians in their residency or other graduate medical training do not meet the definition of physician per the rules established for the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Program (OAC 310:681-1-9.1(a)).

In order to recommend that an individual obtain a medical marijuana license:

- The physician must establish a medical record for the patient and must have a bona fide physician-patient relationship.
- The physician must determine the presence of a medical condition(s) for which the patient is likely to receive therapeutic or palliative benefit from the use of medical marijuana.
- The physician must recommend a medical marijuana license according to the accepted standards a reasonable and prudent physician would follow for recommending or approving any medication.
- A physician has the option to register with the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority before recommending a license, which will expedite the application process.
- There are additional requirements for recommending a license to minors or caregivers.

There is a legislative group developing recommendations to revise the statute when the Oklahoma Legislature is back in session in February 2019. As the statute and regulations are updated and revised, additional updates will be disseminated.

Great Plains Family Medicine

Great Plains Family Medicine Program recently announced new leadership positions for two long-time faculty physicians and a new core faculty member.

Tomás Owens, M.D., has been named Great Plains Family Medicine Residency program director following the untimely death of founding director, Neal Clemenson, M.D. A family medicine faculty physician at Great Plains since the program's 1995 inception, Owens served as associate program director since that time.

Owens earned his medical degree from the University of Panama and trained at the University of Oklahoma Family Medicine Residency Program where he was chief resident. He completed a fellowship in geriatric medicine in the Department of Internal Medicine at the Mayo Clinic. During his full-time faculty tenure at the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center (1993 to 1995), Owens was distinguished with the Teacher of the Year Award. He is a clinical professor in the departments of Family and Preventive Medicine, Geriatric Medicine and Internal Medicine at the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine. He is also a clinical instructor at the Mayo Graduate School of Medicine. Since 1999, he has served as INTEGRIS Baptist Medical Center's chairman of the Family Medicine department.

Terrence Truong, M.D., is the new associate director for Great Plains Family Medicine Residency Program. Truong received his medical degree from the University of Texas-Houston and trained at the University of Oklahoma Family Medicine Residency Program, where he served as chief resident. He joined the faculty of Great Plains in 2001 after ten years of private practice in Mangum, Oklahoma.



According to the powers that pay, doctors have become very inefficient. CMS would rather pay less to a less-well-training provider to take care of patients than pay me what I used to make. It's their opinion that I can no longer have a luxury of practicing medicine the same way I was trained twenty years ago. I still take thirty minutes with each patient. As a kidney specialist, I could manage their kidney disease in five minutes, but they like to tell me about their grandkids and ask my opinion about every other medical problem that I'm not paid to manage and teaching my residents in the room adds time as well. All of this easily fills twenty-five minutes. Maybe I do need a pay cut if you think of it that way. But that's what I take pride in, that's what my patients expect from me. Also, I feel an obligation to train the next generation of doctors. My patients tell me that none of their other doctors spend as much time with them.

If I continue to be paid less and less to take care of patients, what are my options? Continue

to take less salary until I can't afford to pay my employees, get depressed and turn to drugs, alcohol, or suicide? I could just triple the number of patients I see and spend five minutes with each patient and let somebody else hear about their other problems and grandkids.

Instead of self-abuse or poverty, I am hopeful that I will be rewarded financially by devoting more time to my patients. At least that's the promise of alternative payment models. It all depends on whether my perception of "quality health care" is the same as that of CMS.


